Starting at Second Class, we are required to participate in service projects. For us, it is often easy, because we have so many Eagle candidates who are planning and undertaking projects. ROCK CLIMBING

The Joshua Tree climbing and camping trip will take place on Friday, March 16 to Sunday, March 18. The trip provides a wonderful opportunity to boulder, climb, and rappel. No experience is necessary – we teach you. No climbing equipment is required – we provide for those who don't have their own. Hike preparation is on Tuesday, March 13 (it is mandatory). SUMMER CAMP

If you have not yet signed up for summer camp, now is the time to do so. Summer Camp will be Sunday, July 29 to Saturday, August 4 at beautiful Camp Chawanakee located high in the mountains north of Fresno. This is the ideal location for Boy Scouts to earn Merit Badges and other advancements. Most boys make significant progress toward their next rank advancement while at Chawanakee.

Fees for Summer Camp are \$340 for summer camp plus \$100 for transportation, or \$440 total. The \$100 transportation fee covers the Scout's roundtrip on a 47-passenger bus to Chawanakee. No boy will be denied summer camp because of financial hardship. The Troop will provide financial assistance to any family who needs it to send their son(s) to summer camp.
