

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#### COMMITTEE CHAIR CORNER

Handling the advancement process in a troop as large as ours is a challenge. There's no question we've had some hiccups in the past regarding Scoutmaster Conferences and Boards of Review. However, we think we've now got a process in place that will work and is fair to all those involved (Scouts and the Troop Leadership).

The process starts with the individual Scout informing the senior Scout who has been designated the focal point for Advancement that he (the Scout wishing to advance) has completed all the requirements for a rank and needs a Scoutmaster conference. This conference will be scheduled and the Scout informed about the date and time.

The Board of Review (BoR) will occur within one month after the Scoutmaster conference, i.e. the third Tuesday of each month has been designated as a BoR night and there should be plenty of adults available to handle all the BoRs. A BoR may occur on another Tuesday evening, but the longest wait should be until the third Tuesday of each month.

The Scout must take responsibility for the scheduling step; parents should not attempt to schedule a Scoutmaster conference or Board of Review. Let's all try to make this new process work. If any parent has concerns about their son's advancement process, please contact me or Mr. Noda and we will discuss with the appropriate leadership folks and determine what issues exist, then work to solve them. Thank you all in advance for your cooperation.

So, if advancement is the responsibility of the scout, how can we as parents help? Talk to your son, read his Boy Scout Handbook, familiarize yourself with the rank requirements, ask him what skills he hopes to work on next, encourage him to ask a senior scout, Asst. Scoutmaster, or Scoutmaster for help. Then, let it happen at the scout's own pace. Each boy is different and will find the time when it is comfortable for him to proceed. It may seem not to happen quickly enough for us parents at times but it will happen when the scout is ready. --Sally Bickel

## ----Catalina Tip to Tip Hike----

Join the troop for one of the most unique hikes of the year. Hike the entirety of Catalina Island, from Two Harbors and the West tip to Avalon and the East tip. The exact itinerary has yet to be planned, but it will most likely follow the route of previous years. We'll depart for Two Harbors the morning of Thursday, Apr. 16, and should be back by the afternoon of Sunday, Apr. 19. That will give us four days and three nights to cover as much of this island as we can. Unlike our troop's normal hikes to the mountain forests of the mainland, we'll be hiking either along the beaches and cliffs of Catalina's famous coastline or through the grassy hills and scrubby peaks of the Island's interior. Although the elevation gain is minimal, there are some long distances to travel, so this hike is classified as moderate; those participating should have at least some backpacking experience. Grant Ketterer's Eagle Project will be held on Saturday and Sunday, April 25 & 26, 2009. The project is at the Sierra Saddle rest area and trail in the Angeles National Forest. This is a moderate hike - No prior backpacking experience is required.

We camp at the site of the historic Mt. Lowe Resort. Hike out Sunday morning over summit of Mt. Lowe and lunch at historic Phillipe's in downtown LA. Scouts will need to bring money for lunch.

Profile: 5.3 miles, 1,450', 2.1+2.7=4.1 BPH, TH 5,125', C 4,475'.

Peaks: Mt. Lowe 5,603' [mini] and Muir Peak 4,688' [not rated]

We will plan to meet at the Scout House around 7:45 AM on Saturday the 4<sup>th</sup> so we can depart around 8:00 AM. Scouts will need to bring their "Yellow Card". If you have any questions, please let me know.
