## Joshua Tree Desert Hikes Oct 12-14

This year we are planning TWO desert hikes:

The **first** is an easy 4 miles each way to a real desert Oasis. We camp away from the actual water and away from the trail in a place of our choosing. This is desert camping at it's best.

The **second** trip is an intermediate trip of 8 miles on Saturday and 7 miles on Sunday. There is about 1000' of elevation gain. You'll carry ALL your water for the weekend. On the way out Sunday everyone will do a 1hour service project. This trip will earn the Desert Backpacking award.
