#### SPL CORNER

Hi everyone. The troop's annual night hike is coming up in December, and though I can't promise weather as interesting as last year's, I know we'll have a great time. Lately I've been thinking of a question: Why do we hike? There certainly is more to hiking and camping with the troop than spending time with friends in really neat places. I'll share with you a few stories of the hikes that helped shape who I am. Some of you may have shared these experiences with me, and I'm sure you got as much out of them as I did. We learn lots of skills at meetings and at merit badge classes, but there is no better way to learn than actually needing a skill in the wilderness. On long term in 2005, a man whose wife had been severely burned awakened our group in the middle of the night. Tim Breen, former SPL, learned what he could about the woman's injuries, offered advice about how to treat the wound, and provided his first aid kit to the man. Few other situations better express the importance of being prepared, and this is something I will never forget. More recently this summer, a good friend and I came down with a mysterious illness on long term. The next day we ascended a 12,000-foot pass, and I didn't know whether or not I would make it. But I pressed on, realizing that my problems were more mental than physical, and I convinced myself that every step took me closer to the top. I came away from this experience with a greater understanding of perseverance. Other smaller challenges are faced all the time on hiking trips, and from these we can learn cooperation, resourcefulness, and independence. So don't shy away from a trip just because your friends aren't going. Think of what you could be missing out on!
